

Year 1 really enjoyed History Week and thought about how events take place in the past, present and future. The children considered the events within our daily routine to understand chronological order and explored some photographs of items that have changed over time. They discovered that bikes, shoes and even schools have changed a lot!

The children then placed some of their key historical learning on a giant timeline!






As part of their Wriggle and Crawl topic, year 2 have researched the places minibeasts like to live as well as the conditions required for a successful micro habitat. They then used their new knowledge to build their own bug hotels. They are looking forward to welcoming and observing a range of visitors in their hotels!

Year 2 have also been investigating snails. They found out that snails like moving on water, but not too much water. Snails leave a sticky trail behind them, and this helps them to move. The children enjoyed handling the snails and feeling the different textures of the body compared to the shell. Well done year 2 for being gentle and showing great care to your little visitors!



Year 3 have been continuing with their Tribal Tales topic this week. (3SG in school and 3TH at home!) The children have been researching the type of clothing people wore during the Stone Age period and how they made their clothes given the constraints they had during this time. Using their research, the children then came up with a design criteria to create different ideas for Stone Age outfits. The children have also been ensuring they get outside and enjoy a range of fun PE activities.




Year 4 have spent a week learning from home and the children (and parents) have been amazing. Maths, English and wider curriculum learning has continued and the Year 4 team were really impressed with the number of children attending daily Live Sessions. However, we are looking forward to returning to the classroom! As part of their home learning, Year 4 completed some artwork based on landscapes. The children applied their learned sketching and shading techniques to create landscape drawings. In this, they focussed

on light and shadow and how they could show this using shading. The children then created line drawings of mountainous landscapes and used either warm or cool colours to show a particular emotion.





Year 5 children have been studying pollinators and how plants reproduce. The children dissected flowers and labelled them with the scientific names for the parts of the plant which enable it to reproduce. Great work Year 5!









Year 6 have been investigating circuits and learning the symbols for each component.

As part of exploring different ways to make a circuit using switches, batteries and bulbs, some children realised that paper could be added to the motor to make a fan!









The children in our ARB have continued their Enchanted Forest Topic with explorations of sound! They have been outside and listened to the wind and leaves and have played instruments alongside the story 'We're going on a bear hunt.' The children have looked at the bark and leaves of the trees whilst considering what they need to live and grow. They have also recycled waste to create bug hotels. What a busy week!


